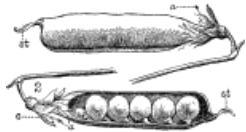

Driving Directions:

West Bound on I-90

Take Exit 270 (Four Lakes). Travel on HWY 904 for 6 miles. Once you enter Cheney, you will pass through two stop lights. Turn right on C Street. On-street parking is available throughout the campus (meters are not monitored on Saturdays) and free parking is available in Lot P2 and P17.

East Bound on I-90

Take Exit 257 (Tyler). Travel on HWY 904 for 11 miles. Once you enter Cheney, turn left on Washington Street. On-street parking is available throughout the campus (meters are not monitored on Saturdays) and free parking is available in Lot P2 and P17.

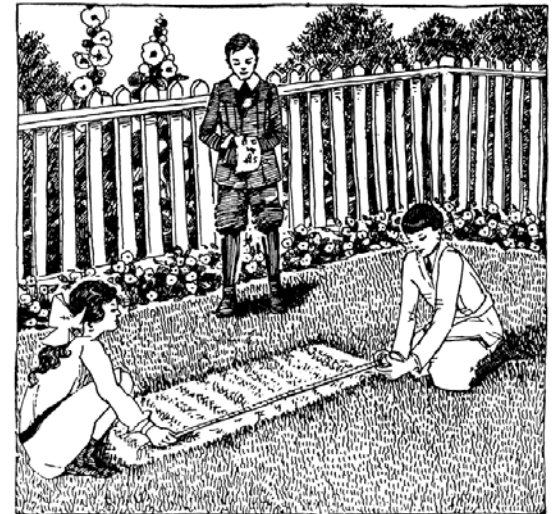
